Board Chair & CEO Message, continued...

When the global pandemic occurred, Hundreds of thousands of young people lost their livelihoods and youth unemployment skyrocketed to 30% in Canada.

Critical entry level job sectors were heavily impacted, and YES was needed by youth more than ever.

We quickly moved all services to remote delivery to protect staff and clients, providing innovative online services including Skills to Succeed, LinkedIn Learning and virtual counselling to ensure business continuity and activate our vision of "changing lives forever".

YES provides innovative programs and services, and above all, hope to youth for their future. YES builds prosperity for our clients, their families and our communities. Our strategic plan is thoughtful in its approach and evidence based to strengthen YES further

in areas such as: Upskilling and digital literacy programming; strengthening our impact reporting to evidence the return on investment and real impacts we have on people's lives; and focusing on our greatest asset: our people. This will enable us to provide supports, professional development, and the right policies to strengthen our staff and better equip them with the tools to best serve our youth.

Racialized workers, young people, and women with young children have been among the most severely affected by increasingly precarious work over the last decade and have also been the most likely to lose their jobs during the ongoing public health crisis. Black, Indigenous, and People of Colour have unemployment rates almost twice as high as other Canadians. The majority of youth YES has served for over 50 years identify as underrepresented and all our programs are designed to best serve these groups-we were pleased to launch innovative programming this past year including cloud technology training as well as increased mental health programming to help address these issues.

Acknowledging and addressing the growing mental health crisis, we have increased our mental health supports and programming. Working with a qualified instructor, we have introduced Cognitive Behavioural Therapy to

support our most vulnerable youth through this crisis. Launched on a small scale in 2020, we plan to expand these critical services to more young people in 2021. 83% of the participants who accessed CBT sessions at YES said they felt more prepared for entering the workforce, with 85% reporting an increase in their confidence to look for work.

In times of distress, youth need a caring supporter whom they can turn to, to help them make sense of the abrupt changes to their livelihood and to keep them connected to professional networks. YES continues to leverage its Mentorship Hub to connect youth with industry leaders virtually, through email and through telephone, so that they do not feel isolated in a time of social distance and to keep them connected to their industry.

We have launched new programming which will prepare youth for a drastically shifting workforce. With technology, changing demographics and globalization altering the types of jobs available and the skills required, we need to ensure that young people are provided with the ability to develop the knowledge, values and a diverse range of critical thinking, communication, and information management skills for the digital age in order to give them a competitive edge in

the labour market. Our technology programs offer disadvantaged youth the opportunity to acquire in-demand skills such as Amazon Web Services Cloud certification, training in future skills, access to mentors, and work experience. We will seek to scale up these services.

We were pleased to welcome Premier Doug Ford, Minister Monte McNaughton, Minister Todd Smith, Jamil Jivani, the Advocate for Community Opportunities, and MPP Jane McKenna to YES for a live news conference and government announcement. The Premier announced the Skills Catalyst program, where YES received funding for its free 'YES2Tech Learn & Earn' cloud computing program for youth. Premier Ford and Minster McNaughton thanked YES for its incredible work and role in helping so many disadvantaged youth change their lives.

September 2020 saw YES host its first ever virtual event! The Forward Together event, hosted in partnership with the Citi Foundation, brought together nearly two hundred participants, with representatives from Government, community, and corporate partners from across Canada being joined by youth to explore innovative employment strategies that can adapt to the changing world we are living in without leaving young people behind.

We were pleased to scale our work with our newer Corporate partners including SAS, Amazon Web Services, and IBM. We also saw a significant increase in the numbers of volunteers assisting at YES. We had hundreds of staff from our Corporate partners provide workshops, mentorship, and one on one support to our youth. This was a huge benefit during the pandemic and we are very grateful.

As we look to a post pandemic economy we are confident YES has the right programs and innovative training solutions to prepare youth for the world of the future. We would like to thank our Board, staff, and volunteers for their significant contributions. Despite an incredibly challenging year, YES will be even stronger in the future and continue to help positively change even more lives.

YES By the Numbers 2020-21

Of those youth who gained employment, an incredible **73%** were still employed at the three month check in. These young people generated more than \$9,000,000* in wages in those 3 months.

* Calculation assumes average 30 hours per week worked.

83% of the youth who came to YES with no income or who were reliant on social services for support gained employment, started a business, returned to school or enrolled in training after their time at YES! And 71% of those youth who gained employment were still employed three months after the program completed – generating more than \$6,000,000* in wages!

Of the youth who came to YES who disclosed a mental health issue, **83%** had a successful outcome after completing their time at YES and of those who gained employment, **67%** were still employed at the 3 month check in mark!

More than **1,200** youth accessed online employment training - powered by Accenture and offered by YES - and of those who completed programming, **85%** had a successful outcome.

72% of the youth who participate in our YES2Cloud upskilling program had a successful outcome!

83% of the participants who accessed CBT sessions at YES said they felt more prepared for entering the workforce, with 85% reporting an increase in their confidence to look for work.

75% of participants who accessed CBT sessions at YES stated they felt more valued following their participation, with 100% stating that attending the sessions has been a positive step in their lives.

84% of the clients who identified as female had a successful outcome after their time at YES, a higher success rate than those who identified as male (82%). Female participants also saw an increase of 13% on their average hourly wages in 2020/21 compared to 2019/20.

We saw a 23% increase in the number of youth disclosing a Mental Health issue in 2020/21.

289 people who disclosed a disability or who were in receipt of ODSP gained employment after their time at YES!

Youth who identified as Black, Asian, Latin American or Indigenous saw a **21%** increase in their average hourly wage in 2020/21 compared to 2019/20.



YES Highlights

Leading the way with Workforce Development Programs

For young people, the last year has had a truly devastating effect. Jobs in sectors that typically employ young people were decimated by lockdowns, and many of those who came to YES were looking for new career paths that would make them resilient to this disruption.

Furthermore, YES saw inequalities accelerate, as underrepresented populations in the workforce, such as women, newcomers, persons with disabilities, Indigenous and racialized youth were disproportionately impacted by COVID-19.

Recognizing the challenges that these youth face, as well as the labour market shortage in specialized skills in industries such as the tech sector and construction, YES has successfully implemented Workforce Development programs as a solution for youth whose livelihoods have been devastated by unemployment. These programs include:

- YES2Tech and YES2Tech Learn & Earn, run in collaboration with Amazon Web Services (AWS) re/Start, provides youth with indemand cloud computing skills through scenario-based learning, hands-on labs and coursework to prepare them for entry level cloud-computing roles. We are grateful to the Citi Foundation our YES2Tech program partner, as well as the Ontario Government and Accenture who make our YES2Tech Learn & Earn program possible.
- YES2Cloud provides youth with industry-driven, technical skills development training.
 From basic digital literacy skills training through Accenture to specialized training such as programming, data analytics and cybersecurity through SAS, IBM and AWS Educate, youth learn specialized skills for their chosen career path to become competitive for roles in the tech industry.



 YES2Trades, made possible through our partnership with the Ontario Government, the Labour Education Centre, State Street, JP Bickell Foundation and Dynacare, teaches youth hands-on, construction trades skills to help prepare them for jobs that were resilient throughout the pandemic. These programs helped underrepresented populations obtain the skills for in-demand, labour market needs, with 70% of youth in these programs identifying as a visible minority,

44.5% being New Canadians, and 40% reporting having been out of school or work for more than 6 months. Our programs were incredibly effective, with 72% of youth who participated in

our workforce development programs having a successful outcome, and with those who became employed earning an average wage of \$24.19/hour!

Building Youth Resilience through Cognitive Behavioural Therapy

An alarming amount of youth have disclosed negative impacts on their mental health due to the isolation, financial uncertainty and economic turmoil that was exacerbated by COVID-19. YES has over 6 years of experience providing specialized mental health support through our innovative Lighthouse Project for youth with mental health issues. In 2020/2021 YES went

further to respond to the escalating mental health crisis by introducing free Cognitive Behavioural Therapy sessions, a proven form of psychotherapy, to support youth through these difficult times. Accessing these sessions through either a one-on-one or group format, the Cognitive Behavioural Therapy sessions teach youth coping skills and resilience to

maintain their mental health throughout their job search and for re-entering the workforce. 100% of youth who have taken part in this initiative reported that these sessions had a positive impact on their life, and 85% reported feeling more confident in looking for work after attending their sessions!

Volunteers! Volunteers! Volunteers!

With COVID shifting many industry leaders to working from home, YES saw an incredible increase in supporters reaching out to volunteer with our youth. YES is grateful to the volunteers who quickly offered their time and specialized knowledge through leading or designing webinars on a variety of topics, including participating in career panels, conducting mock interviews and resume clinics, and teaching youth about growth mindset and positive mental health habits for work/life balance, to name a few!

YES' Workforce Development Program Manager Shari Raghoo presented findings of YES' latest report (read more on Page 17) and we also heard from Amazon Web Services AWS Senior Technical Evangelist Jonathan Dion who demonstrated during the event why cloud jobs are among the most in-demand in a COVID/post COVID world.

We are so grateful to all our speakers and participants for their time and we look forward to hosting more virtual events in 2021!



Evaluation

Program evaluation is central to our learning and performance improvement.
Through evaluation we can determine the efficiency, effectiveness, sustainability, and impacts of our programs.

Impact evaluation helps us to better understand the extent to which activities reach unemployed youth and the magnitude of their effects on people's welfare. Several sources are collected and consulted in determining need for our programming, including labour market research, youth surveys, focus groups, environmental scans and literature reviews. These sources of data provide insights into designing and implementing programs that meet the needs of youth with in-demand, sustainable employment.

YES uses several tools to measure the success of our programming, including via pre and

of our target for effectiveness in Service Impact, with 83% of youth employed or in education, 8% higher than the provincial target!

The same program received a Service Quality Score of

8.37

and out performed the Provincial Average whose score is 6.96.

post surveys, and collecting demographic information from youth before, during and after their time at YES. We also check in with youth as to their employment status at the three-month mark of exiting the program. Youth interviews give further insights into program outcomes, as well as youth and employer information entered into the proprietary YES database, EZ. Data collected via our EZ database includes youth's income status, education level, and time out of school work or training before coming to YES. In total we measure over 400 data point indicators.

YES has partnered with an advanced analytics company, Forum Research, to track the progress of youth using pre and post program assessment, to evaluate outcomes such as jobpreparedness, readiness and networks, work experience, and gains in key competencies such as confidence, critical thinking and resiliency. We also use this software to measure our program deliverables against other programs Canada-wide. Data we have collected to date includes:

- 90% of participants in one program indicated they are more prepared for the workforce after program participation, in comparison to the 64% Canadian average!
- In the same program, 81% of youth now feel confident in listening to others to understand their point of view.

Using a series of standard Provincial performance indicators, which measure success through program effectiveness, customer service and participant suitability, YES also measures its Employment Ontario programs against other Ontario-wide organizations, with our YES 1610 programming exceeding the Service Quality scores of other non-profits running similar programs both in our central and provincial regions. For example, our YJC 1610 programming received a score of 8.37 whereas other programs across the province received an average score of 6.62.

These evaluation methods inform programming and are synthesized into reports and presentations for knowledge dissemination amongst community partners. In September 2020, we hosted our "Forward Together" Event, to celebrate and share the release of our evaluation report on four free resources: mentorship, mental health curriculum, digital skills training through Skills 2 Succeed, and entrepreneurship curriculum to over 100 community partners, thought leaders and corporations. and provide support throughout their learning experience.



YES Programs and Services

All job seekers can access a variety of services and supports at YES to aid them in their career planning, job search, and job maintenance. All services were hosted virtually throughout 2020/21, and YES also has seven offices located across the Greater Toronto Area that make it easy for youth to find help when and where they need it.

BizStart Entrepreneurship	BizStart is a full-time, 6-month entrepreneurship training program.
Canada Ontario Jobs Grant	Canada-Ontario Job Grant (the Job Grant) provides an opportunity for employers to invest in their workforce, with help from the government.
Employment Services	Employment Service provides employment services for all job seekers, including students.
HSBC Career Accelerator	The HSBC Career Accelerator Program provides youth facing multiple barriers to employment with specialized pre-employment training to help them obtain the soft skills and global skills needed for the labour market of today and the future.
Job Central	Job Central assists youth ages 15-30 living in the underserviced neighbourhood of Keele/Eglinton to find employment.
Lighthouse Project	The Lighthouse Project assists job seekers living with mental health issues who are looking to obtain and maintain full-time (30 hours per week or more)
Ontario Works Career Discovery	Career Discovery provides career testing and assessment services for those receiving social assistance.
Pre-Apprenticeship Program	YES, in partnership with Labour Education Centre (LEC), is offering an 8 week full-time pre-apprenticeship program for those interested in working in the construction trades. The 8-week program allows for participants to attain both the hard skill training and workplace readiness skills needed to be successful in the construction trades.
Ontario Works Career Opportunity	The Career Opportunity Program assists job-ready individuals to find and maintain employment. Individuals must be on social assistance and be referred by a TESS caseworker.
Street to Jobs	The focus of the Streets to Jobs program is to aid homeless youth overcome the key barriers to employment that keep them out of work.

This Way ONward Program	This Way ONward, presented by Gap Inc., is a life skills and paid store internship program to help teens and young adults from low-income communities land their first job. The program provides the opportunity for youth graduates of YES' job readiness training programs to apply their learning through paid internships at Old Navy stores in the GTA.					
Toronto Youth Job Corps	The Toronto Youth Job Corps (TYJC) program assists youth 15 – 30 years of age to find employment through group-based employability skills training, personal development, and work experience.
